The first day of my home schooling shocks everyone's system. Focus on only 3-4 subjects in the first week and add the rest in the next week. Homeschooled in California have five basic options for teaching children at home: file affidavits to function as private schools; according to homeschooled officials. Enroll in a private school satellite homeschooled program. Hire a certified tutor (or become a qualified tutor yourself). Use independent learning options in public schools. Enroll in a public charter school for homeschooled. Your first step as a new homeschooled family is to thoroughly research each of these options, decide which one is right for you, and follow the homeschooled laws associated with your choice. For homeschooled, ca testing requirements depend on the homeschooled option selected by each family. For example, home-based private schools do not have test requirements. But charter school students have the same standardized testing protocols as students in other public schools. Even if you don't use the option where standardized testing is mandatory, you can still decide to let the homeschooled participate in the test. Some parents use standardized tests each year as a benchmark system to see how far their students are progressing. Others use them to identify potential gaps in the curriculum or child retention.
